Laws and Customs

Bless New Month

This Shabbat is <u>Shabbat Mevarchim</u> ("the Shabbat that blesses" the new month): a special prayer is recited blessing the <u>Rosh Chodesh</u> ("Head of the Month") of the upcoming month of <u>Elul</u>, which falls on Sunday and Monday of next week.

As noted a <u>here</u>, this day is especially significant since this is the final (and culminating) such blessing of the year.

Prior to the blessing, we announce the precise time of the molad, the "birth" of the new moon which is:

Shabbat August 23, 2025 11:26 (6 chalakim) PM

It is a Chabad custom to recite the entire book of <u>Psalms</u> before morning prayers, and to conduct <u>farbrengens</u> (chassidic gatherings) in the course of the Shabbat.

Omit Tzidkatecha Tzedek in Afternoon Prayers
The mournful paragraph of Tzidkatecha Tzedek is omitted from the afternoon prayers.

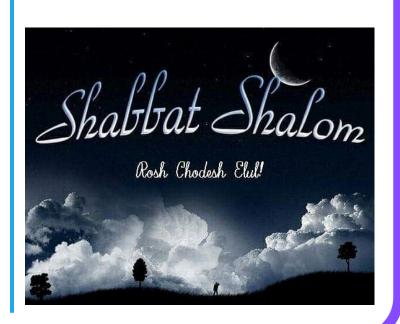
JEWISH HISTORY

Flight from Liadi (1812)

On this date, <u>Rabbi Schneur Zalman of Liadi</u>, who supported and aided the Czar's army during the Napoleonic wars, was forced to flee his hometown from Napoleon's forces which were advancing through White Russia in their push toward Moscow. After five months of wanderings he arrived in the town of Pyena. There he fell ill and, weakened by the tribulations of his flight and the harsh Russian winter, passed away on the 24th of Tevet, 5573 (1812).

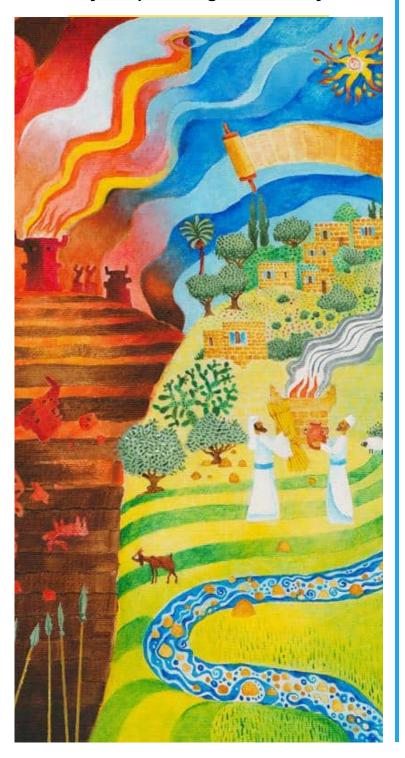
Passing of R. Eliezer Zusia Portugal, the Skulener Rebbe (1982)

R. Eliezer Zusia Portugal (1898–1982), the Skulener Rebbe, is best known for his superhuman efforts to rescue Jewish orphans and refugees in Eastern Europe before, during, and after World War II and his continuing support of them. He immigrated to the United States in 1960, after imprisonment in Rumania and international efforts to secure his release. He was renowned for his lengthy prayers and the beautiful tunes he composed.



CHUMASH RE'EH

Seventh Aliyah: The male firstborn of kosher cattle must be consecrated and given to the Kohen to eat. If the animal is blemishless it is first offered as a sacrifice in the Temple. The Torah reading concludes with a discussion regarding the three festivals: Passover, Shavuot, and Sukkot. In addition to some laws regarding each of these festivals individually, we are commanded to rejoice during the festivals and all males must be in attendance in the Holy Temple during these holidays.





RE'EH HAFTORAH IN A NUTSHELL

<u>Isaiah 54:11</u>-55:5

This week's haftorah is the third of a series of seven "Haftarot of Consolation". These seven haftarot commence on the Shabbat following Tisha b'Av and continue until Rosh Hashanah.

G@d addresses the "afflicted and storm-tossed" *Jerusalem* "who has not been comforted," assuring her that she, and her people, will be restored to full glory. The foundation, walls and ground of *Jerusalem* will be laid with precious stones. Her children will be "disciples of the L@rd," and will enjoy abundant peace. Any weapon engineered against her will fail.

The prophet then invites the thirsty to acquire "water," namely those who are thirsty for spirituality should study the quenching words of Torah. He promises the nation an everlasting covenant similar to that made with King David. This is also an allusion to Moshiach, the Messiah, David's descendant, who will be revered by all of the nations of the world.

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DAILY TEHILLIM - PSALMS 140-144

Psalms 140-144 express themes of divine protection, reliance on G@d, and ultimately, praise for His goodness. These chapters detail David's pleas for deliverance from wicked men, his trust in G@d's righteousness, and his anticipation of G@d's ultimate judgment and salvation. They also contain expressions of gratitude for G@d's blessings and a declaration of faith in His eternal reign.

Psalm 140:

David asks G@d to protect him from the wicked and their schemes, emphasizing their deceit and violence. He expresses his faith that G@d will judge the wicked and reward the righteous.

Psalm 141:

David prays for protection from evil men and their temptations, asking for guidance in his speech and actions. He trusts in G@d's righteousness and justice.

Psalm 142:

David laments his isolation and persecution, expressing his trust in G@d as his refuge and portion. He anticipates G@d's gracious deliverance.

Psalm 143:

David acknowledges his unworthiness and seeks G@ds forgiveness and guidance. He prays for G@d's faithfulness and righteousness to be revealed.

Psalm 144:

David praises God for His strength and kindness, acknowledging G@d as his deliverer and protector. He expresses gratitude for G@d's blessings upon his people and anticipates a future of peace and prosperity under G@d's reign.

THE REBBE'S KAPITEL (CHAPTER)

Just as it is customary for each individual to recite daily the Tehillim corresponding to their age, Chassidim customarily recite the Kapitel (chapter) corresponding to the Rebbe's years. This year is Kapitel 124

MATTERS OF MOSHIACH

29 Av UNCONDITIONAL L♡VE

A voice is heard on high, lamentation, bitterly crying. [It is] Rachel weeping for her children. She refuses to be comforted for her children, for they are gone. So says Hashem, "Refrain your voice from weeping and your eyes from tears. There is reward for your deeds," says Hashem... "There is hope for your future," says Hashem; "your children shall return to their border." (Yirmiya 31:14-16)

The Midrash relates that at the time of the Temple 's destruction, Avraham, Yitzchak, Yaakov, and Moshe came before G-d to plead for their people. Each of them gave examples of their self-sacrifice for G-d and His Torah.

But G-d was not appeased. Rachel stepped forward and requested that her children be forgiven in the merit of allowing her sister to marry Yaakov to save her from embarrassment. Immediately, G-d agreed, and the promise of Redemption was secured.

The key to the Redemption lies in self-sacrifice, to help another person not only spiritually but also in the simplest, material sense.

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
